Program / Project Description:

On March 13, RMI and the rest of the world were flipped upside down by the COVID-19 pandemic. We immediately knew that we had to figure out how to best serve and protect our individuals. Difficult decisions had to be made and fast. On March 17, we temporarily closed the doors to our Life Enrichment Program, suspended Supported Employment services, and turned the entire focus of our organization on 110 of our participants living in our group homes and in the community. In the initial six weeks of the Stay at Home protocols, we spent nearly \$146,110 on unbudgeted expenses and program suspensions.

In the 129 days or four months, since then, our program continues to face unknowns. As service and revenue disruption persists, we recognize what we now consider organizational stress could evolve into an existential threat. As our participants remain at home, our programs and staff are continually evolving. While we can continue billing for our Life Enrichment Program, we are losing approximately \$38,639 each month. The \$38,639 includes not only the closing of LEP but the ceasing of Supported Employment services in the community (\$26,972), an open bed fee in one of our group homes (we are not able to admit anyone during this time, \$5,000), and extra labor expenses in the houses (\$6,667). If revenue disruptions persist through December, we are looking at losing \$193,195 in billable services. This number does not include the continued need for PPE gear, hand sanitizer, cleaning products, surgical gowns, and more.

We recognize that organizational growth cannot halt in times of crisis, and it is our responsibility to keep the mission of RMI clear and in focus. Before the COVID-19 pandemic, we had set lofty goals for FY2021. We will continue to pursue these goals while managing the current crisis. Our biggest goal for FY2021 was to officially begin a Capital Campaign to improve the services provided by RMI. We will start searching for a building that can accommodate both our central office and our Life Enrichment Program.

Funds from the Gordon Hartman Family Foundation will be used exclusively to address the shortfalls of both programming and increased costs of operations. Indirectly, these funds will allow our participants to continue living the way that they are accustomed to, and it will provide peace of mind to our participant's families. This grant will allow us to continue providing high-quality services to our 53 group home residents, 40 Host Home Companion participants, and 17 participants living independently in the community.

Evaluation Plan:

On a 60,000 foot level, we will analyze our monthly expenditures to assure that we are protecting the resources entrusted to us. Evaluation can be done in the following ways:

- 1. Maintain efficacy of our current programs- General operating support will allow RMI to continue providing our current services. Success can be evaluated by keeping our day programs services in place while our participants remain at home. Additionally, we can continue to evaluate program success based on occupancy in our group homes. Success can be evaluated by maintaining current occupancy. All but one of our 53 beds remain occupied.
- 2. Maintaining the safety and security of our participants- this can be measured through the frequent surveys conducted at our group homes. All of the protocols that are put in place by city, state, and federal entities must be followed. Maintaining adherence to these protocols is necessary but costly. By the time all PPE gear, hand sanitizer, cleaning products, food delivery, and more adds up quickly.
- 3. Maintain the resources needed to continue running our operations. This will be evaluated on a monthly basis and reported to the board of directors. Although we did anticipate a slight margin for the fiscal year we will adjust expenditures as needed.

Plans to sustain project beyond the term of this request:

Reaching Maximum Independence is approaching our 40th anniversary, in this time we have maintained program operations and effectiveness through 5 different recessions. We have a track record of success and we will work tirelessly to ensure that the current financial climate does not affect our operations. By adhering to current protocols, maintaining occupancy in our group homes, and providing day program services to our participants we will be able to continue our operations for the foreseeable future.
